## About Arizona’s Crisis Services

Arizona has a strong behavioral health crisis network. Any Arizona resident can get help from this network, regardless of health insurance coverage. Services include:

- 24/7/365 crisis phone lines staffed by behavioral health providers.
- 24/7 mobile teams staffed by behavioral health providers. These providers can visit the person in crisis to assess and stabilize them. They can also transfer the person to a higher level of care if needed.
- Crisis centers that can observe and stabilize a person in crisis. These facilities can also offer medication to help with treatment.
